CENTURY AWARD



In 1921 the Rimbey Agricultural Society was founded and built permanent fair grounds with a grandstand. The fair grew each year with the tenth annual fair in 1931 deemed a major success despite cool weather. Livestock exhibits attracted some people while others preferred the exhibits of canned fruits and vegetables, cheeses, and domestic crafts. The Society built a new grandstand in 1934, with a roof and sides to provide protection against the elements for 500 spectators. Rodeo came into its own after 1965 when the Rimbey Exhibition Association was formed and today the chuck wagon races draw crowds for Rodeo Weekend in June. Current President, Jill Moore & Past President, John Trenson of the Rimbey Agricultural Society were at the Awards Show to accept the Alberta Agricultural Society Century Award. Rimbey was always a great centre for horse races and fairs were a summer tradition even before the agricultural grounds were developed.

It started in 1879, when 275 people gathered together to exhibit their best livestock, grain, vegetables and crafts. This collection of farmers, ranchers and agriculturists were eager to volunteer their time for the greater good—to serve the community in a way that would benefit everyone.



Northlands was established in 1879, prior to the official incorporation of the city of Edmonton, and initially known as the Edmonton Exhibition Association. The organization consisted of a board, and a group of shareholders invited by the board. Past presidents of Northlands historically held voting status for life. The board of Northlands often included community members and local and provincial political figures, which helped contribute to the power and influence of the group and its members. All of Northlands' board members were unpaid volunteers.

While also operating as an agricultural society, Northlands was also well-known as an operator of



venues in Edmonton; after the downtown Thistle Rink was destroyed in a fire, the association adapted a new livestock pavilion it had constructed in 1913 to also be able to operate as a hockey rink, resulting in what was later renamed Edmonton Gardens after an expansion in 1948. Northlands later oversaw the construction of its replacement, the Northlands Coliseum.

On April 18, 1972, the Northlands board unanimously agreed to build a 16,000-seat Coliseum. On Nov. 3, 1972, the first workmen went on site. Here is an Aerial View of the Northlands Coliseum being built.



As one of Canada's oldest and largest agricultural societies they were strongly committed to fostering the development of Alberta's agricultural industry, as well as showcasing its innovations and successes throughout the province and the world.







They produced events like Farmfair International and provided hands on learning to give children the opportunity to learn through our Northlands Urban Farm School and the Northlands 4-H Club.



Northlands also had a world class racetrack. What started in the late 1800's as casual horse racing between the neighbours of The Rossdale Flats area, later turned into the official race park of Northlands in the year 1900. It was officially in operation for 113 years.



On June 10, 2021, Northlands announced that it would dissolve effective July 5, 2021, and that stewardship of Farmfair International and K-Days would be assumed by Explore Edmonton moving forward. The group's financial difficulties had been further impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, which required K-Days to be cancelled in both 2020 and 2021. President Peter Male stated that Northlands had "left an indelible mark on Edmonton", and that "we are all very proud of the legacy of our organization, a legacy that truly belongs to the dedicated staff, the tireless volunteers who have sustained Northlands for almost a century and a half.



An organization that provided decades of entertainment at events like K-Days, Farmfair International and the CFR was on a rollercoaster of its own for years. Northlands as we know it is over, but its agricultural society history older than the city itself — will forever remain an important part of Edmonton and Alberta.



The Calgary Stampede was proud to celebrate the resilience and determination of our great province through a province-wide fireworks display on Friday, July 9,2021. The Fireworks Spectacular presented by Bell, took place in Edmonton, Red Deer, Lethbridge and Calgary. All Albertans were invited to join together in celebration as they filled the night sky with a dazzling display of fireworks, in recognition of shared goals and to celebrate a bright future for our province. This incredible display was a must-see, as the largest and most sophisticated firework event produced in Canada this year.

All eyes across Canada were on the Calgary Stampede this year, as they hosted a scaled-down parade on the Stampede grounds. Though the parade was not open to the public this year, it was broadcast live on the News and streamed live online. The parade still had many of the things Calgarians know and love about it, including floats, marching bands and mounted riders. This year, the Calgary Stampede invited a group of essential workers to participate in the parade, including doctors, nurses, grocery store workers, bus drivers and food and hotel industry employees. AG SOCIETY GRANTS

Agricultural Society Farm Safety Grant – (AAAS)

Contributions to businesses will be either nonrepayable (contributions up to \$100,000) or repayable (contributions up to \$500,000). Eligible applicants need to be part of the tourism ecosystem and will include tourism entities that cater mainly to visitors (not including local residents). The following eligible applicants include:

- incorporated businesses, primarily small-and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs)

AGLC—RAFFLE BULLETIN

Policy Amendments – New Opportunities

JULY 13, 2021

This bulletin is to advise all licensed charitable organizations and raffle workers of **IMPORTANT AMENDMENTS** to the Raffle Terms & Conditions.

The following raffle policies are effective July 13, 2021.

- In response to the evolving raffle landscape in Alberta, AGLC is creating new opportunities for charities by:
 - expanding to allow electronically generated bearer ticket raffles (e.g. 50/50 draws) over multiple days (up to 14 days) at an entertainment event such as a festival (previously, electronic bearer ticket raffles were limited to single-day events);
 - expanding the availability of percentage draws (e.g. 50/50 draws) to be conducted with any raffle, and charities are no longer required to guarantee 20 per cent minimum prize value based on the total ticket value of the raffle for cash raffles;
 - introducing raffle ticket subscriptions for purchasers;
 - expanding progressive raffles by introducing the option to offer secondary progressive prizes; and
 - o reducing the timeframe to hold raffle prizes from one year to three months.
- AGLC is also continuing to ensure integrity as well as to simplify and improve clarity of policy for charities by:
 - removing the concept of "traditional tickets" from raffle framework to reflect increasingly more flexible raffle policies and less distinctions between ticket types;
 - o addressing prize claim procedures for progressive raffles; and
 - o introducing prize selection procedures for progressive raffles.

Please familiarize yourself with the amended policies and ensure all affected staff are notified of the new requirements.
