2023 – 2024 was a very interesting and challenging year for AAAS and our members.

Drought, fires, floods all contributed to the diversity of hurdles, but as usual the Agricultural Societies were up to the challenge as was AAAS.

This past year saw the highest demand for AAAS member services ever. Strategic planning topped the list followed closely by governance training and conflict support. I personally visited 26 Agricultural Societies travelling more than 24,000 km and spending nearly 100 days on the road. I find this work to be incredibly rewarding but all encompassing. Many of the conversations and some of the meetings included the department staff. Carmen Andrew and company have been very supportive of the members and have collaborated with AAAS to successfully navigate through some of the most difficult challenges.

Unfortunately, the cost of providing these services and other critical components of AAAS programming has escalated beyond the income we receive. This is reflected in our financial statement. The AAAS board recognizes the value of these programs to our ag societies and agreed to proceed with the escalated support until our year end.

The organization is now looking at options for the continuation of the in-person programs which will include innovations to revenue generation. There were several applications to the federal and provincial governments requesting new program support, unfortunately, these were not successful. AAAS will continue to explore all options to effectively and efficiently support Agricultural Societies.

This year also marked a significant effort by our regional ag societies to advocate for additional support. As always AAAS's position for additional support referenced all our members. Whether we are speaking of our largest member, the Calgary Stampede, our 7 regional members, or the 284 primary ag societies, the impacts of these amazing organizations are critical to the communities they serve. As a result of this advocacy, Minister RJ Sigurdson commissioned a study of the regional ag societies.

At the time of this report the results of the report and the actions that might be taken have not been revealed. Unexpected consequences of the focus of the Alberta government and the study are that until a direction has been decided by the Minister, funding for AAAS to support our members will not go forward.

We continued to work on the strategies set out by our Board and the current strategic plan. AAAS creates and implements a 3-year strategic plan every 2 years. This process ensures all directors can be part of the strategic planning process, allowing AAAS to pursue an appropriate direction. 2024 was such a year. The board embarked on a 2 ½ day facilitated strategic planning process. The new strategic plan was approved at the June Board meeting.

From the Board and Staff, we wish every one of you an amazing summer 2025!

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Critical Update

AGLC Charitable Gaming Policies Restructuring

What Societies Need to Know

AGLC Updates Charitable Gaming Policies

Big changes are here for how your Ag Society can manage gaming proceeds! The Alberta Gaming, Liquor and Cannabis Commission (AGLC) has announced significant updates to its Charitable Gaming Policies Handbook (CGPH), impacting eligible expenses, reporting expectations, and streamlined guidance on acceptable uses of charitable funds. All Societies that rely on gaming to support programs and infrastructure should review these updates to ensure ongoing compliance.

Details for Members

The AGLC has released an updated Charitable Gaming Policies Handbook, with a full policy review aimed at reducing administrative red tape and offering greater flexibility for charities like Agricultural Societies. This includes:

- A consolidated structure making the Handbook easier to navigate.
- Streamlined definitions of eligible and ineligible use of proceeds.
- Enhanced clarity on expenses related to building repairs, operations, programming, and community events
- Introduction of a new Charity Quick Reference Guide, designed to help organizations quickly determine how funds can be used under the updated policies.

This change could affect how your Society plans and allocates funds for community initiatives, infrastructure improvements, and program delivery.

Unlocking Funding Opportunities for Agricultural Societies

Provincial grants are still available to support the work of Alberta's Agricultural Societies. These grants offer valuable funding to help sustain programming, enhance facilities, and ensure Ag Societies can continue serving as important rural hubs. The Community Initiatives Program (CIP) Operating Grant offers funding for ongoing core operations of non-profit organizations addressing social issues, making it ideal

for sustaining Ag Society programming. The Community Facility Enhancement Program (CFEP) Small provides up to \$125,000 to upgrade, expand, purchase, or build public-use community facilities, assisting with smaller-scale infrastructure projects. For more extensive endeavors, the CFEP Large grant offers between \$125,000 and \$1 million for substantial facility enhancements or new constructions.

Protecting Alberta's Food Supply Chain

Alberta's government has announced the renewal of the Alberta Ag Plastic. Recycle It! program, reinforcing the province's commitment to sustainable agriculture. By extending this vital program until 2026, Alberta will continue to help farmers and ranchers safely recycle grain bags and

plastic twine. Since 2019, the program has already diverted more than 6,000 tonnes of ag plastics from landfills, preserving Alberta's land and water for future generations. This is another step forward in building a greener, more responsible agriculture sector.

Ag Plastic recycling program extended to 2026, keeping waste out of landfills.



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

FARM SAFETY WEEK

Canadian Agricultural Safety Week kicks off with a province-wide focus on safer farms.

March 17th marked the start of Canadian Agricultural Safety Week, spotlighting the importance of creating safer farms and rural communities. Under the theme "Safety is Our Promise," this national campaign calls on all agricultural societies, farmers, and ranchers to make farm safety a top priority.

Canada Responds to China's Tariffs on Agriculture

Federal relief rolls out as Alberta farmers brace for impact from China's tariffs.

China has imposed 100% tariffs on Canadian canola oil, canola meal, and peas, along with 25% tariffs on pork, fish, and seafood products. This move comes after China's 'anti-discrimination' investigation against Canada, and will significantly impact Alberta farmers.

Key Impacts on Alberta Producers

- Alberta is a top producer of canola and pulses (peas), which are now subject to these tariffs.
- Pork producers will also face new export barriers to China.
- The trade tension adds to ongoing challenges like U.S. trade uncertainty and animal disease risks.

Government of Canada Support

In response, the Government of Canada has introduced new measures through AgriStability to help farmers manage income losses:

The Alberta government is helping spread the message by investing in awareness programs and tools to reduce injuries and foster a safety-first mindset across the sector. Together, we are creating a stronger, safer agricultural future.

Putting Safety First Across Alberta

- Compensation rate increased to 90% (up from 80%) for 2025.
- Payment cap doubled to \$6 million.
- Faster cash flow: Eligible producers can access interim payments up to 75% of their expected AgriStability benefit.
- Targeted Advance Payments will be available for sectors or regions experiencing confirmed market disruptions.

Other Financial Tools

Farm Credit Canada is providing \$1 billion in new lending through the Trade Disruption Customer Support program to support producers affected by these tariffs and other trade challenges.


